From the Desk of Prison Radio WHEN WE FIGHT WE WIN!

Dear

Let me tell you why I feel this is a promising moment to be alive.

I can feel the seismic shift. The breadth, seriousness, and success of the abolition movement has been steadily building.

Throughout the country we are literally gaining ground. We are winning the hearts and minds of the people. We are winning specific campaigns. We are asking the right questions and are strategically focused on dismantling the prison industrial complex and freeing our people. Twelve years ago I moved to Philadelphia. My family has deep roots here. Living here, I have been able to join the front lines of a dramatic abolitionist movement. It is harrowing, exciting, and mission critical. Once you experience how heartless and ghoulish the prison industrial complex is, there is no going back.

The purpose of mass incarceration is to prevent community self-determination and to commodify prisoners. It siphons off money and drains resources from the people and families that are the most marginalized. Once you understand this — it is impossible to remain silent.

We are offering you the opportunity to join the resistance.

I can feel the community power built and led by the formerly incarcerated here on the ground in Pennsylvania, by the Abolitionist Law Center (ALC), Straight Ahead, Amistad Law Project, Human Rights Campaign, Let's Get Free, CADBI (Coalition to Abolish Death by Incarceration) and all of their amazing partners. This collective power is creating a sea change; leveraging the power of 5,000 lifers in PA and their families. Our comrades are coming home and those still behind the walls will be free. Governor Shapiro (who, mark my words, will run for President) put ALC Executive Director Saleem Holbrook on his transition team. He endorsed Kendra Brooks, the abolitionist socialist running for re-election to the Philadelphia City Council. This is all about power. And the formerly incarcerated are building it.

Here is what we are looking at doing this Fall! We need some capital and large scale gifts to help stabilize our base.




